# **Blessings & Needs in Growth**Jerry DeGroot, *Principal/CEO*

Unity Christian has experienced a steady increase in student enrollment over the past few years, and we anticipate this trend continuing. This has necessitated the need for expansion. The primary objective for this expansion is to accommodate the larger student population. The upgrades and expansion of the educational facilities will enhance the overall learning environment and bolster programs to support student needs.

comprehensive analysis of enrollment trends in the Eastern Ottawa County Schools over the past five years reveals a consistent upward trajectory. This data is critical for projecting future student numbers and determining the scale of the required expansion. The facility utilization at our current capacity is proving to be challenging as we assess the needs of all students socially, academically, and spiritually. This analysis informs decisions about which specific facilities require expansion versus renovation.

The Sequence I expansion includes additional general education classrooms, increasing the size of our current industrial arts space, adding a science classroom, upgrading the computer-aided design and engineering space, and providing room for a blossoming robotics program. The crosswalk connecting the educational wings will provide safer traffic flow and add a second elevator to assist students with physical limitations. The new greenspaces outside these buildings will allow for more student gatherings, increasing the amount of socialization that happens at high school. All areas will be integrated with modern educational technology fostering a tech-savvy learning environment.

Sequence I is well underway and if construction conditions continue to be favorable, students will be walking these halls and using these classrooms in August of 2024. Current funding is at \$9.5 million of an anticipated total cost of \$12.7 million. A little over 800 individuals have made commitments to Sequence I and over half of those individuals who made a onetime gift have been contacted to make a 3-year commitment to finish the funding for Sequence I. Please consider how you can support this project.

While planning *Sequence II*, we evaluated the long-term benefits of the expansion considering factors such as: increasing student enrollment, improving academic performance, enhancing fine arts, and emphasizing the importance of flexible spaces that can adapt to evolving educational needs.

Unity Christian is committed to providing a well-rounded education that nurtures students spiritually, academically, and physically. Recognizing the importance of fine arts and our lack of facilities and space for these programs, Sequence II focuses on enriching these areas to align with the schools' mission. We humbly ask for our community's support and prayers as we construct a building that offers our students a holistic education.

With the desired *Sequence II* start date of June 2024, the estimated project completion is projected to be fall/winter of 2025. As plans are solidified, join us in lifting the plans in front of our God - moving forward in God's plans and design!

## **SEQUENCE II DESIGN & FLEXIBILITY**

The proposed Sequence II expansion aims to create an environment that fosters creativity, physical well-being, and spiritual growth. Through careful consideration of curriculum integration and architectural design, this project seeks to enhance the overall educational experience for students in a Christ-centered environment.









The fine arts facility includes a large performance stage that supports performances like student plays, choir, band, and orchestra concerts. These activities are currently being held at area churches. These spaces are rented at an additional cost, and we are confined to the church's schedule for rehearsals and performances. Other spaces connected to the stage will provide studios for dressing & makeup, vital storage, and much-needed equipment used in fine arts. The multi-use space will consider acoustics, lighting, sound, and other factors ensuring this multi-purpose space is able to accommodate various artistic mediums and events.

In line with our value of multiuse spaces, the fine arts space will also be used daily for the increasing number of students incorporating physical education into their schedules. The flexibility within this expansion will allow for maximum use through a diverse array of activities. This new area will serve as a platform for students to showcase their talents while reinforcing Christian values.

Through many discussions with teachers, our trustees, and architects, we have a high degree of confidence that *Sequence II* addresses our needs in both fine arts and physical education while allowing for flexible student use. This project emphasizes the importance of addressing the current and future needs of our growing student population.

With a vision to deepen and enrich the spiritual foundation of future generations, we are embarking on an ambitious project – one we cannot achieve without you. # THE URGENT 'WHY' OF FUNDING SEQUENCE I & II

- •Educational programs and methods are changing and supporting our students is a must! We know there are enough people within our community to support the school and the facility expansion, but it will take everyone. We ask you to consider pledging 1% of your income for the next 5 years!
- •To sustain faith-infused, biblically-based education well into the future, we need to share the responsibility. Hoping for the largest donors to cover 80-85% of the cost of the facilities is not a sustainable model. The alternative of raising tuition will drive us toward being a school for the financial elite and we cannot do that!
- •Capping enrollment is simply not something we want to do! However, this outcome will be difficult to avoid if the funding for Sequence II is not raised in time. Growth is coming whether we are ready for it or not. This growth is coming primarily from within our feeder system and running out of space would be a community problem without a 'good solution.'
- •To ensure Sequence II can begin this summer, we need 3,000-5,000 donors to contribute \$500.00 to \$1000.00 per year for 5 years. Can you be one of those donors?

# TODO EN EL TIEMPO DE DIOS

Mr. Scott Wesseldyke

In the fall of 1985, a new Spanish teacher arrived at Unity Christian High School. Scott Wesseldyke came to Unity after spending 8 years discerning where God's path was leading him. Now he looks back at the 39 years he has devoted to Unity Christian High School and can see God's hand through the highs and lows of life. He recollects how different the day to day of teaching was. "We had hand crank ditto machines. We used reel-to-reel tapes for listening to the Spanish lessons. There were no computers in the classrooms. Our biggest concern for a while was if a student had a beeper or not. I had to take a class on using slide projectors, film strips, and overhead projectors to graduate with my degree. But kids were still kids. They had problems and they found solutions."

"But kids
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Scott's journey began not far from Hudsonville. He attended Zeeland Christian Elementary School and Holland Christian High School. He then graduated



from Calvin College and finally ended up at The University of Michigan for a master's degree. Scott credits his upbringing for planting the seeds to his desire to be a Christian School teacher. But the road to teaching Spanish at Unity Christian High School was not always straightforward.

Scott went to college planning to graduate with a major in physical education and a minor in biology. Everything went according to plan until he had to take calculus for his minor. When this class proved to be a barrier, he knew he had to pivot. While his physical education classes had gone well, he needed to find a new minor.

During his freshman year Scott took an accelerated Spanish program to complete his foreign language requirements quickly. His Spanish professor pulled him aside and let him know that he was quite gifted at Spanish and could receive a minor by only taking a few more classes. Still needing to fill his minor requirements, Scott took his professor's advice. Despite earning a Spanish minor, he never planned to use this skill

set. He had his sights firmly set on teaching P.E.

Between his sophomore and junior years of college Scott's Youth Pastor, Bob Grussing, told him he needed to go on a summer mission trip to Mexico. Scott resisted, saying he needed to stay and earn enough money to cover his tuition for the following year. Scott eventually acquiesced and signed up for the trip. Through fundraising, he covered the mission trip's cost and his upcoming tuition. While in Mexico, he sharpened his Spanish language skills - which he still did not intend to use post-college.

When Scott graduated, he and his new wife, Judy, cast a wide net. As a civil engineer, Judy could get a job anywhere there was a decently sized city. She told Scott to apply for teaching jobs anywhere that met those criteria, and she would follow. This proved easier said than done. Scott applied for a slew of jobs across the country and consistently was the runner up for positions.

Eventually, Scott and his family moved to Ann Arbor, Michigan so he could begin graduate school. After a bumpy move, Scott was led to a position teaching P.E. at Emerson School for the Academically Gifted, a private but non-religious school. Here he eventually began teaching Spanish as well as physical education.

Over the next 4 years, Scott applied for several jobs in West Michigan, but the Lord closed the door each time. Scott grew frustrated. It hurt to feel shut out of a community that he had grown up in, student taught in, and wanted to raise his family in.

Finally, in the spring of 1985, he saw a job opening at Unity for a Spanish teacher. Desiring to have

his young daughter enrolled in Christian school in the coming years, he applied. He got an interview, and then a second, and to his surprise, was finally offered the job.

During his time at Unity, Scott has experienced exciting high points with his students. He had the honor of coaching the men's bowling team that won Unity's first men's state title and he took many groups of students on trips to Mexico. His other coaching experiences were in Varsity Soccer, Freshman Soccer, and Tennis. He also experienced personal low moments too. During Scott's time at Unity, Judy lost a battle with cancer. Despite this being an unimaginably challenging time personally, Scott was so grateful for the Unity community during this time. He felt supported as he navigated cancer treatment with Judy and was cared for during her eventual passing.

Scott witnessed the transition from Unity being a small country school to a 700+ student school in a new – and still expanding – campus. When he looks back at his career at Unity, Scott feels immensely blessed. "I can

remember a number of times over the years when I would look around at the teaching staff and think, 'Wow! I am part of the BEST teaching team there is.'"

Looking back at his life, Scott can see how God was shaping and preparing him for every next step in his journey even when he did not understand why. He was guided into Spanish when that was not part of his plan. He spent time being prepared for his role at Unity while the Lord told him to 'wait' instead of opening doors to other jobs in West Michigan. The Lord blessed him with children with his wife Judy even when he was yet to meet his wonderful wife, Linda. Linda has supported him in his many activities at Unity, such as his years of coaching Freshman Soccer and helping with many student activities. He has been blessed to pour into students the way many people have poured into his own life.

Scott remarked, "I have learned to hold on to Mark 11:22, ' Jesús contestó: "Tengan fe en Dios."' Through all the many days at Unity, I know that I need to simply have faith in God. There

are so many stories that I can tell about my experiences with students, highs and lows, but I know that God has our lives in his hands."

As Scott finishes his final year of teaching, he contemplates what the next step is in God's path for his life. We know that God has something wonderful in store for him despite how much he will miss the energy and excitement of working with teenagers every day.

# **THROUGH THE GENERATIONS:**

with Mr. Marv Klyn



Marvin "Marv" Klyn was a teacher at Unity from 1966 until 1995. During his 29 years teaching high school history, Marv became a beloved fixture at Unity. He was known for 'Mr. Klyn's famous lip sync performance,' his beloved sense of humor, and his ability to make learning history fun.

As a history teacher, Marv often heard students complain, "History is boring." He took these complaints seriously and recalled something his own history teacher had taught him - that "history is His Story." He made efforts to ensure that history was interesting to learn because it was not just random stories from the past but rather the plan that God had set for the world.

This was demonstrated through the newspapers Marv displayed on his classroom walls. Over the years he had built quite the collection of newspaper headlines covering major world events. Early in his teaching career he decided to display them to his classroom. He went down to Gemmen's and purchased the supplies to build 27 frames. He rotated his collection, so students saw new headlines each year.

Long before Marv was a teacher at Unity Christian High School or even a resident of West Michigan, his story began in the farmlands of southern Iowa.

## FIFIELD, IOWA 1933 - 1942

Born on July 3, 1933, Marvin and his twin brother Marion entered the world during the Great Depression. The depression greatly impacted the trajectory of their lives. Marv vaguely recalls fireside chats with President Roosevelt, the New Deal era, and the changing tide of cultural norms post roaring twenties.

Life for Marv began on 'Klyn Farm' as 1 of, eventually, 12 children. He and his siblings attended Whitebreast School - named for a local legend about a bear with a white spot on its chest that was killed in a local creek by a Native American Chief. Marv calls the school "proverbial" in every sense. They walked one and a half miles to school each way, there was only one school room, a belfry on the roof, and a wood burning stove in the middle of the room.

His Dutch heritage was a part of Marv's life right from the beginning. His parents would speak Dutch when they did not want their kids to know what they were discussing. Phrases like kleinabeechie, small kids, and stoute joungens, naughty boys, were used often in their home.

By the late 50's the only home that Marv had known ceased to exist. The government purchased the farm ahead of the creation of Red Rock Reservoir when the Des Moines River was dammed.

# **MONROE, IOWA** 1942-1947

As a result, the Klyn family moved to Monroe, Iowa. Marv's father was able to buy a 120–160-acre farm due to low interest rates caused by the Farm Bill.

In Monroe, the Klyn children attended their first Christian school, Pella Christian Grade School. This building was two stories, had multiple classrooms, and there were buses used to collect children, like the Klyn's, who lived far away from the school.

Sadly, during the family's time in Monroe, Marv's mother passed away due to complications from surgery.

## OTLEY, IOWA 1948-1951

Marv's family moved again, this time to Otley, Iowa. Their new farm was smaller; they had fewer family members to house as the older siblings left the nest in addition to the loss of Mrs. Klyn. Marv recalls that the reason for this move was not entirely clear but always guessed that his older brothers encouraged his dad to move to a smaller farm now that he had less help and was beginning to age.

In Otley, the Klyn children now lived even closer to the Christian school system in Pella. Marv has particularly strong memories of Marion and him beginning Pella Christian High School. The school had a tradition of letting the seniors initiate the freshman. The Klyn Twins were tasked with asking a set of female twins on a date and then running down a long molasses and feather covered sheet while upperclassmen jeered them on. Despite a 'sticky' beginning, Marv greatly enjoyed his high school experience.

## COLLEGE YEARS 1951-1956

In the fall of 1951, Marv went off to Calvin College. He credits attending Calvin to the events that occurred in the year leading up to his enrollment. Rev. Van Houten, who had already influenced his father on the importance of Christian day school, encouraged Marv and Marion to attend Calvin. Additionally, the twins received letters from Henry De Wit, the head of finance at Calvin, personally encouraging them to attend. Finally, their father took them to visit Calvin's campus.

The trip from Otley to Grand Rapids was a long one. Many of the freeways that now connect the cities had yet to be built. A trip that now takes 7 hours, took well over 11 hours on local highways. Marv remembers driving through Hudsonville on that trip and being 'wowed' at the many lanes of traffic he encountered.

In the summer of 1953, Marv's life took a change. Rather than being an Iowa boy who returned home from Calvin each summer, he truly became a Michigander. That summer he decided to begin taking summer classes to earn his teaching degree. His mother's dream of her children becoming teachers inspired him to commit to that goal.

Shortly after, Marv left a job at Keeler Brass in 1954 to work at Besteman Produce. When Marv met with Mart Besteman for an interview, he shared that he was a student at Calvin College. Upon hearing this, Mart hired him on the spot and told him to bring in his class schedule so they could give him shifts around his classes. Marv credits his time at Besteman Produce with teaching him about the importance of hard work.



Mary student taught in the fall of 1955, but it was not his first time in front of a classroom. He had taught previously for one year in Prairie City, Iowa. A small school needed someone to fill a gap for just one academic year to keep them from closing. But that school in Prairie City had been a two-classroom school - vastly different from the Ottawa Hills (then one of the wealthier areas in Grand Rapids) school he was in now. Marv felt very blessed to have had an amazing mentor teacher, Mrs. Goudzwaard.

"I set out with a purpose and a goal. With encouragement from many, and hard work, along with God's help, I accomplished it. I am thankful and grateful for the training I received in my home, for the years of Christian education at Pella Christian Grade School,

Pella Christian High, and Calvin College. Thankful, too, for the many experiences I had in all those years."


## THE ARMY 1956-1958

Marv had been granted a 2S deferment that allowed him to finish his education. After graduation, he kept his promise to the Marion County Draft Board. He reported back to that board as soon as he graduated Calvin and entered the military on July 19, 1956. He began training at Fort Chaffe.

Marv feels that he was a sheltered person before he entered the army. He had primarily been exposed to people who lived and believed the same way he did. He is so grateful for the strong Christian influences of his upbringing, but he also believes his time in the army was valuable. He learned to be in community with people who were different from him while maintaining his values.

After finishing his tour in Korea, Marv got a job teaching 6th grade at Grandville Christian while on inactive duty. His family had mixed feelings about this choice. Some of his relatives felt that he should return to his hometown to teach.

For many years after his tour in Korea, Marv lived in the upstairs apartment of a woman named Annie. Annie and her daughters loved to scheme to set Marv up on dates. Many of these attempts were unsuccessful but they persisted. Their plans finally came to fruition when they invited Marv to church one Sunday evening and introduced him to Phyllis. Marv remembers, "The plan was completed. I met Phyllis. I will never forget the night. The rest is history."



# **UNITY YEARS** 1966-1995

In the spring of 1966, a Grandville Christian coworker informed Marv that Unity Christian High School was searching for a new history teacher. He dismissed the idea of this position. He was thoroughly enjoying teaching middle school and had not felt any disquiet about his current position. But even the mere suggestion of this job spun nervous thoughts in his mind, "Would I be any good? Would I be a success?"

A few days later, Marv was enjoying a Saturday when he felt a 'nudge.' The job at Unity came to mind again and he felt curious about the opportunity. "Why not?" seemed to echo in his mind. He immediately called Mr. Vander Vliet, the principal of Unity, and put his name in the ring for the history teacher position.

Mary interviewed with both Mr. Vander Vliet and the board but discovered that he was one of 15 well-qualified applicants. He figured he had little chance of being offered such a competitive position.

God had other plans though. Several days later, Marv received news that he was being offered the contract. He and Phyllis prayed for God's direction and ultimately felt that the 'nudge' that Marv had received was the Lord's leading. Marv happily accepted the contract, not yet knowing this was where he would teach for the remainder of his career.

Over the years, Marv recalls many funny and memorable things happening at Unity. On a particularly memorable day, as 5th hour began, Marv and his class heard a loud boom. He looked out into the hallway and saw pieces of a bathroom stall covering the floor!



The 1996 Silhouette was dedicated to Mr. Klyn in honor of his retirement. The Silhouette recounts that during his time at Unity, Marv taught over 5,100 students, honed his unique sense of humor, and planted roots in the Hudsonville community!

Marv couldn't quit Unity completely. While the 94-95 academic year was his last as a

teacher, Mr. Postma convinced Marv to continue running the bookstore and to occasionally substitute teach.

We thank Mary for sharing his wonderful life story with us. His story is a testament to God's guiding hand. We are grateful for the years he spent investing in and educating our students and pray for blessings over his continuing legacy through his friends and family members.
